United States? You likely know there are 50. Before there were states, there were colonies. Colonies are places under the control of another country. You may know there were 13 British colonies at first. Do you know how those colonies became states? Or how we went from 13 to 50?

Before any colony could become a state, they had to

Great Britain. They did this on July 4, 1776. We call it Independence Day. The colonies were already fighting by then! The first American attack on the British was in Rhode Island. Rhode Islanders attacked an English ship in 1772. That was well before the war began.

The colonies' war for independence is called the American Revolution. It went from 1775 to 1783. The colonies weren't like today's states when it ended. There weren't any states like today's states until they made the government they use today. That means they had to write the Constitution. Delaware was the first to ratify, or approve, the Constitution. It became the first






the United States. After the 13 colonies, Vermont was the first new state. It joined in 1791. The 48 connected states all joined by 1912. The newest state is Hawaii. It became a state on August 21, 1959. Alaska became a state earlier the same year.

How did they become states? Becoming a state can take many no changes are needed, Congress can vote to let the new state join. Then the president needs to approve that vote.

You can still see these steps being followed today. Many people in Puerto Rico want it to become a state, but not all. Who knows? The 50 states might become 51 or more one day!


